Our next General Meeting on May 28 hits both goals! First, there is exciting news: Portland Parks and Recreation has \$4 million dollars to install a trail around all/parts of Rose City Park Golf Course. See the cover story for details on the meeting, which includes an earlier starting time and pizza.

At our February meeting more than 100 people from Rose City Park--and neighbors from Roseway and Hollywood--met to talk about the future of Sandy Boulevard. The message is clear: people care deeply about how Sandy impacts our neighborhood. Key themes included: making Sandy safer with slower and fewer vehicles, more trees, and a more thriving business corridor. We also heard that people value Sandy for transportation. For some that meant maintaining it as a car route, for others it meant adding special bus and bike lanes.

In partnership with our neighboring associations, our first step will be to ask the city for more information and planning on this critical roadway that divides our neighborhood. Stay tuned for more information.

MAKING A GREEN INVESTMENT ON ROSE CITY BLUFF

Our green investments on the Rose City Bluff continue to grow! Now in our sixth year, our group of neighborhood activists, affectionately called the Rose City Bluffers, has continued to restore the area by removing invasive species and replacing them with native species. Last year our volunteers grew over 400 native plants.

Well, good news spreads and synergy happens. This year Jennifer Kinsey and Rachel Kato donated 129 bareroot trees and plants obtained from the Yamhill Soil and Water District Native Plant Sale. Species included Cascara, Oregon White Oak, Indian Plum, Mock Orange, and Douglas Spirea.

And, Rose City Park Elementary School's gardening program donated soil for the bareroot plants to be potted in donated recycled gallon pots that came forth from many neighborhood gardeners. The Elementary School had received a generous donation of soil from Roots Garden Supply. All of the potted plants will be nurtured throughout the summer by "foster parent" volunteers in anticipation of the upcoming Fall Native Planting Day next November.

In addition, Reed Lewis, Suzanne Briggs and Marcelle Thurston are coordinating the third annual spring Native Seed Project. As a consequence, 26 neighbors are now growing 21 species of native plants from seed. Come welcome these neighbors' gift of many potted starts to their final destination at the Fall planting party.

Land Use and Transportation Projects

The LU&T Committee meets the third Thursday of every month from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the German American Society at 5626 NE Alameda. Information on the meetings and proposed agendas will be posted ahead of time on NextDoor and on our website at RCPNA.org. These are open public meetings, and all are invited to attend.

Hollywood HUB

Starting the week of April 8 and continuing for about six weeks or so, crews will be working at the intersection of NE Halsey and 41st Ave. Initially, the work is on underground utilities.

During some of this time:

- 41st Ave will be closed to through traffic at Halsey Street during the hours of 7 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Halsey Street will be narrowed to one lane in each direction during the hours of 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Pedestrians will be routed to 42nd Ave during the hours of 7 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Halsey Project

The schedule for the project, which changes Halsey from four lanes to two lanes and a center turn lane from 47^{th} to 60^{th} , has slipped once again. Tri-Met is hoping to take the project to bid in the next few weeks which would push the construction start to, at the earliest, this summer. Tri-met will schedule a meeting with this Committee once bids are received and a contractor is on board.

Businesses Along Sandy Boulevard

The committee continues to discuss what the Neighborhood Association and this Committee can do to support businesses along Sandy Boulevard (and throughout the neighborhood). Empty storefronts in the neighborhood and in Hollywood are a concern for the long-term livability of Rose City Park. We will reach out to the adjacent neighborhood associations and business districts to see what support we can provide. NEIGHBORS GET NEW RADIOS TO HELP IN EMERGENCIES


The Rose City Park-Hollywood NETs team has received a \$500 resiliency grant from Central Northeast Neighbors (CNN) to upgrade their radio communications with the purchase of 10 new, more powerful radios to be used for communication during community emergencies.

Neighborhood Emergency Teams (NETs) are all volunteer teams of local residents trained by the Portland Bureau of Emergency Management and Portland Fire & Rescue to provide emergency disaster assistance within their own neighborhoods. Rose City Park and Hollywood neighborhoods have a combined NETs team.

Previously, the team relied on low-power FRS (Family Radio Service) radios for emergency communication, which members purchased using their own funds. These lower-powered radios had limited range, and other local neighbors with their own hand-held radios would also be using these frequencies to communicate with family and friends during an emergency, creating additional communication difficulties.

Upgrading to the more powerful, different frequency General Mobile Radio Service (GMRS) radios will increase the resiliency of the neighborhood to respond to emergencies by the RCP-Hollywood NETs team. These radios will be distributed on loan to team members who have obtained the required FCC license.

Rose City Park neighbor Owen Kane has been helping out for five years as a volunteer driver for Project Linkage, a Metropolitan Family Service. Program. If you are a driver, you can join Owen in this satisfying volunteer opportunity. "I feel like it's the little things that go a long way to help the rider feel grounded – a smile, a joke, a listening ear, or asking about grandkids. It is more than a ride to me," said Owen.



This is a flexible volunteer opportunity where volunteers simply let Project Linkage coordinators

know when they are available and the program lets you know who needs a ride and where. The dedicated team of staff and volunteers at Project Linkage has been addressing the critical need for older adult transportation in North and Northeast Portland for over 40 years. Project Linkage provides around 32,000 rides each year, but have to turn down 50-100 rides every week because there is no driver to send.

Normandale Park Shooting Memorial Meeting

On March 7, Rose City Park Neighborhood Association members provided space at the German American Society for Normandale Park mass shooting survivors, supporters, and community members to share thoughts on the second anniversary of the Feb. 19, 2022 shooting. The event was facilitated by Alison Stoll of CNN (Central Northeast Neighbors) and attended by Stephanie Howard, the Mayor's Director of Community Safety and Kimberley Dixon, the District Coalition Supervisor Office of Community & Civic Life.

All in attendance supported the current volunteer installed victim's memorial of planter boxes and lighting. Neighbors expressed a desire to paint a memorial street mural in the intersection of Hassalo and 55th Avenue where the shooting took place. The survivors in attendance said they have an artist who can create a design for the mural. Stephanie will submit the mural plan to City Repair who will advise on logistics. A community meeting will be called in the next few weeks to review the design options created by the survivor group's artist. When finalized it will be up to volunteers to purchase paint and implement the mural this summer. All felt a street mural would offer an opportunity for community to gather together and create something positive after the terrible events of the shooting.
