

# **Rose City Bluff 2025 Native Seed Project Takes Root**

Rose City Bluff Restoration is kicking off its 2025 Native Seed Project. Each year volunteers sow seeds and care for young plants during the summer and fall. Dozens of our neighbors participated in the project over the last two years which resulted in hundreds of new native plants for the bluff.

This year the Native Seed Project will include growing plants from seeds and bare root plants. You do not need to have expertise in growing plants from seeds. The only requirement is that you care for the young plants through the summer months. Rose City Bluff Restoration will provide the seeds or young plants, pots, soil and instruc-



tions. Growers will pick up their designated plants and all of the supplies at the Bluff on Sunday, March 23.

Throughout the year, the project coordinator and growers enjoy sharing and supporting each other. Friendships grow right along with the plants. If growers have summer vacation plans, the project coordinator will help find volunteers to periodically lend a watering hand. # **News about the RCPNA Newsletter**

As you read your edition of the Rose City Park Neighborhood Association (RCPNA) newsletter, do you ever wonder how, exactly, that newsletter got to your porch? Without a stamp or assistance from the US Postal Service, three times a year, this newsletter gets to you and every other household in Rose City Park, 4,200 residences and businesses in all.

How does this happen and who is involved? This newsletter is brought to you almost entirely through volunteer efforts. With exception of the printer, no one involved in the creation and distribution of this newsletter is paid. Decades ago, the structure for the RCPNA's newsletter delivery system was created and while the individuals in key roles have changed many times over, the system has continued to work. This system, developed so very long ago, is an achievement of which we can be proud.

With assistance from the RCPNA Communications Committee members, our newsletter editor (Tom Gauntt) constructs the newsletter from articles submitted by RCPNA board members and community members, and incorporates paid advertisements from supportive local merchants.

Once printed, folded, and stapled by the printer, the newsletters are handed off to the Neighborhood Newsletter Delivery Team. Our current delivery team consists of 2 coordinators, 11 captains and 52 route carriers. The coordinators bundle newsletters for each route. The captains shuttle the bundles of newsletters to the carriers. The carriers personally deliver the newsletter to your porch.

Of all of the positions, the carrier's role is probably the most interactive. It takes about an hour for a carrier to distribute between 50 and 100 newsletters, but it is an hour where carriers get to meet Rose City Park neighbors and serve the community in which they have chosen to live.

The coordinators–Helene and Roger Farnen–also maintain and recruit volunteers to serve as Delivery Captains and Newsletter Carriers. Would you like to have a direct impact on your neighborhood and help with the newsletter? 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# Land Use and Transportation Projects

The LU&T Committee meets the 3<sup>rd</sup> Thursday of every month from 7-9 p.m. at the German American Society at 5626 NE Alameda. Information on the meetings and proposed agendas will be posted ahead of time on NextDoor and on our website at RCPNA.org. These are open public meetings, and all are invited to attend.

#### Anamic Construction - Development on 62nd & Sandy/Stanton

The Committee received preliminary plans from Anamic Construction/Development for a housing project at the former Word & Spirit Church and adjacent properties (2833 NE 62<sup>nd</sup> Ave, 6140 NE Stanton and 6201 NE Stanton). There are four lots with 20 total units planned.

- Status of the project – demolition is complete with grading and site preparation underway. We assume plans are or will be submitted for permit shortly.
- The 20 units will consist of three sets of 4-plexes on the lots zoned R2.5 total of 12 units and two sets of • four cottage clusters/detached units on the bigger lots - total of eight units.
- Unfortunately, none of the units will have garages or off-street parking. •
- Comments on the plans from the Committee and neighbors have been submitted to Anamic. We hope to receive a response soon.

We are still hopeful that Anamic Construction and/or their designer will attend an upcoming committee meeting to review the status of the design. We will keep the neighbors informed.

#### Rose City Recreational Trail Project (at RCP Golf Course)

Portland Parks Bureau received the Community Survey (10/23 - 12/9) and published results on the website (https://www.portland.gov/parks/construction/rose-city-recreational-trail-project). They will hold a community event to review project status in late Spring or early Summer and an open house (either virtually or in-person) to review the final design plans. We will keep the neighbors updated when scheduled.

#### Hollywood Hub Housing Project

Work on the update to the light rail station access is essentially complete. Site work and pile foundation work is underway for the apartments. Neighbors will likely notice increased truck traffic and some lane closures on Halsey. As a reminder, this project has 224 units, 7 parking spaces, 349 bike parking stalls, community/ground floor amenity spaces and a central courtyard.

#### Traffic on 52nd Avenue

We received a report from PBOT on their analysis of new traffic counts. Bottom line is that most of the neighbors requests for crosswalks, traffic calming, stop signs or other measures were rejected due to low traffic/pedestrian counts. PBOT will install new speed limit signs - 20 MPH at several locations, a playground warning sign at Frazer Park and pedestrian crossing signs at NE Pacific Street. Frustrated neighbors may take other action with the new City Council and Mayor.

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
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## A brief history of Portland Fire Station 28 by Terry Parker, Board member



Located on the Southwest corner of NE Sandy Boulevard and 56th Avenue, Portland Fire Station 28 was built in 1913. As one of the various Lee Holden- designed two-story fire stations that were built around the same time, it is the oldest working firehouse in the City of Portland. When the building was originally constructed,

there were stalls in the apparatus bay for horses that pulled the fire apparatus. Years ago I was told by a then retired fireman that on hot summer days there was a sense horses had been housed there. Portland Fire apparatus city wide became fully motorized in 1920.

In the 1950's and 60's, the apparatus housed at Station 28 was a 1940's Mack triple combination pumper. It was purchased on Sept. 9, 1943 for \$9,862. Also in the 1950's, located on the West side of the firehouse was a large tower with a Civil Defense Siren on top that was occasionally tested as a drill for residents in the area to take cover.

In 1984, the building was vacated when Multnomah County Fire District 10 was consolidated with *Continued on page 8*

another station located at NE 59th and Going Street was near enough that two stations were not necessary for the area. Station 28 was given to the Portland Office of Neighborhood Associations and became the offices for the Central Northeast Neighbors. The building was renovated to house the watch room, an exercise room, an auxiliary apparatus bay on the first floor, and crew quarters on the second floor. The entire Station 28 facility was designed to meet current seismic/structural standards for essential facilities. The artwork in front of the station was part of the mandatory 1% for art required with the construction of new buildings. Station 28 was placed back in service in 2005 along with a modern American LaFrance Eagle fire engine which has since been replaced with a newer model Pierce fire engine.

Today Station 28 crews respond to a variety of medical and fire emergencies involving residential and commercial properties. The crews also coordinate and run the Portland Fire Cadet Program. The program is for youths between 16 and 20 years of age. The program runs from September through May and consists of weekly training every Saturday. From the drill ground, assignments, quizzes, and "ride-alongs," each of the cadets gains a basic understanding of fire suppression, CPR-First Aid, vehicle extrication, forcible entry, and command structure knowledge.
